An effort that began more than five years ago has recently been completed. Residents have noticed finely detailed directional signs appearing around Mount Hermon, marking streets, cabins, major buildings and facilities.

The redwood and wrought iron signs were exclusively designed, fabricated, assembled and installed by California artisans and funded through a generous gift. They are truly magnificent as well as functional for all that occurs on the grounds.

A total of 106 signs and posts were prepared and installed from Redwood Camp, throughout the Conference Center and at Ponderosa Lodge.

Felton Faire Project Moves Forward With Application

The Felton Faire project has been renamed to Zayante Oaks but is still proposed as a 55 unit affordable housing project at the corner of Graham Hill Road and Conference Drive. A formal development permit application was submitted to the County on July 29, 2008. In response, a letter was prepared by your Executive Board and submitted to Tom Burns, County Director of Planning and Supervisor Mark Stone. The purpose of the letter was to continue to insist that our water supply be protected
